Start on the activities section way earlier. Not apply to as many pre-lims

I would've figured out my life plan and not wavered in interviews.

Apply for fewer preliminary programs

Get clarity about when to reach out to programs for interviews that you might be interested in but aren't hearing from. My specialty also only has a confidential advisor and I always wondered why; it would be nice to have someone non-confidential.

- taken notes more systematically throughout my interviews- been more diligent with communicating with residents at different programs- used one of my signals for a program in my hometown that I was very interested in but didn't signal because they already had my geographic signal

Try for a slightly higher Step 2. It worked out great in the end for me but I was told Step 2 didn't matter and to just pass, but I think it's starting to more in neurology. It might have given me more ease of mind.

Taken Step 2 prior to applying despite my confidential specialty advisor advising that it was not necessary. I think that some places I would have expected to interview at screened me out.

UCSF specific: increase specialty advisor checkpoints. Not UCSF specific: should be a free process, like applying for other jobs.

Apply to fewer programs.

Please provide any other information that might be helpful to UCSF students who will apply to your specialty choice in the future

Everyone's specific application path is different, so don't feel like the world is ending if things are different for someone else applying with you. Talk to the advisors!

Nothing I can think of that is general and not applicant specific.

Many neuro programs are either categorical or advanced with a guaranteed pre-lim and you might not need to waste money on pre-lim applications.

Talk to your specialty advisor early and often.

Your connections are SO important. Multiple times during interviews, interviewers would comment on mentors and faculty I had worked with because they knew each other personally. I can't emphasize enough the importance of networking.

Only apply to programs that you would be willing to attend. Interviewing is laborious and not fun if you cannot imagine actually being at that institution for residency.

Stay in close contact with Dr. Richie! She is super knowledgeable

UCSF does not stand for "U can stay forever". Ignore what anyone tells you; UCSF does not match home applicants with the same frequency as other peer institutions.
