They are incredibly generous with their time and so helpful! Pediatrics is an amazing field to go into, with an abundance of compassionate and supportive people who are willing to support you. The UCSF advisors, Michele and Patrick, are phenomenal and contribute immensely to how relatively stress-free and streamlined I found the application cycle to be. I think the most difficult part of the cycle for me was narrowing down the programs at the top of my rank list, as I generally felt they would all be great fits and would support me well. Would highly recommend using near-peer resources (recently graduated UCSF students or others that you can personally get connected with through friends), as they can provide really candid and honest reflections on programs. It is also helpful to talk through what was important for others as it helped me better reflect on what is most important for me in a program.
